Our speakers

Emma Vaux

Senior Censor and Vice President Education & Training
(RCP London)

Dr Emma Vaux is a consultant nephrologist and general physician at the Royal Berkshire NHS Foundation Trust and senior censor and vice president (education and training) at the Royal College of Physicians (RCP). As a clinical associate, Emma leads the Academy of Medical Royal Colleges' Quality Improvement: Training for Better Outcomes work on embedding quality improvement training into medical training, building on the RCP's Learning to Make a Difference programme which she led for 7 years. Emma also sits on the editorial board for the Future Healthcare Journal and QI4U and is a Generation Q fellow and Q founding member with The Health Foundation.

After completing her medical degree at the University of London, Emma was awarded a research doctorate from Oxford University. She has completed a postgraduate certificate in teaching and learning in higher and professional education at the University of London, and currently leads an active clinical research programme.

Alongside her clinical work, Emma's other roles include specialty advisor with the Care Quality Commission, NCAS case investigator, NCAS lead assessor and clinical lead at the Oxford AHSN Patient Safety Collaborative Acute Kidney Injury workstream.



Dr Simon Smale

Consultant Gastroenterologist, Manchester University
NHS Trust

Dr Simon Smale attended Medical School in Nottingham before undertaking his early training in Queens Medical Centre and then Northampton. He then moved to London where after a brief period at the Royal Free Hospital working for Professor Dame Carol Black he moved to King's College Hospital under the mentorship of the late Dr Ian Forgacs. Having completed his higher specialist training he obtained his first consultant appointment in York in 2005 and moved to Manchester in August 2018 in order to further develop his interests in functional gastroenterology and the microbiome. He has a track record, as a trustee within the charitable sector, as an entrepreneur and clinician, in using technology and diligent thought about process to enhance the experience of patients and the wider public. Whilst he would classify himself as a clinician rather than an academic, he has an enthusiasm for building collaborations across professional boundaries and looks forward to developing new relationships in Manchester.



Dr Peter Hammond

Head of School of Medicine (HEE)

Peter Hammond's undergraduate training was at the University of Cambridge, followed by Oxford. Most of his postgraduate training was at the Hammersmith Hospital (Royal Postgraduate Medical School) where he did research as an MRC training fellow.

Peter provides a comprehensive clinical service in diabetes and endocrinology, including osteoporosis, but has particular expertise in insulin pump therapy and related technologies, having been an expert advisor to NICE. He is an Endocrinology Lead for the regional Gender Identity Service based in Leeds. Peter has been a member of the NICE Type 1 Diabetes Guideline Development Group and was NHS Diabetes Lead Clinician for insulin pump therapy.

Peter chaired the Locality Prescribing Group for 15 years, was Clinical Director for Integrated Care for eight years from 2007 and has been Training Programme Director for both general (internal) medicine and diabetes and endocrinology for Health Education England working across Yorkshire and the Humber. He is now Head of the HEEYH Postgraduate School of Medicine.
